


Figure 1: A Poster of the Constitution Day Celebrate.




Figure 2: An Agenda for Good Governance: Policy Initiatives in India






Figure 3: Dr. Abhay Singh Delivering his talk on Good Governance.




Figure 6: Poster of the Inter-Disciplinary National Conference on Professional Ethics: Theory and Practice.




Figure 11: Image of Students interacting with the slum dwellers.

T3 ANAEMIA CAMP

Enactus for its second project collaborated with NCC to organise a camp on **anaemia** followed by a talk afterwards in the college on 20th September 2019. The objective of the camp was to **generate awareness** among the students regarding anaemia. Dr. Puneet Jaitley, programme officer for the central district arranged a meeting with our Principal Ma'am, Prof (Dr.) Mrs. Harpreet Kaur to organise the anemic camp in our college. Enactus and NCC were given the responsibility to oversee the modus operandi of the camp. The T3 camp consisted of 2 camp



sites, in-front of the Gurudwara and in the counsellor room on the ground floor. There were 5 teams, assisted by two doctors and each team consisted of a pathologist and a counsellor. Facilities of free hemoglobin checkup were provided and students identified to be anemic were issued with IFA, Vitamin C and Albendazole tablet. They were also encouraged to attend the interactive session with the doctors. The Enactus team ensured the smooth

working of the drive and refreshments were provided to the teams.



The counselling session was conducted by Dr. Puneet Jaitley. He discussed the symptoms of anaemia, spread awareness about different levels of anaemia: from being mildly/ moderately anaemic to being severely anaemic, provided nutrition counselling for the same and advised the students to take further treatment at nearby dispensaries.




Figure 26: Image of the Cleanliness Drive Poster.

1. NSS carries out a spectrum of activities to inculcate values of being responsible citizen. Following is a complete report of NSS for the academic year 2019-2020.

NSS Report - 2019-2020

The Motto of NSS 'Not Me But YOU' reflects the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for service towards the community we live in. NSS volunteers of Mata Sundri College for Women undertook various socially relevant activities during the academic session of 2019-2020. These activities were a learning experience for all of us while contributing our humble service to the society. A brief summary of the events undertaken is as follows:-

The year started with 'Jal Shakti Abhiyan' held on 30th July 2019. A Poster-Making competition on the theme of 'Saving Water Resources' was organized. This was followed by a rally on 'Water Conservation' held in the college premises.

'Swachhta Pakwada' was organized in the college from 2nd August, 2019 till 14th August, 2019. The drive began with Swachhta Oath. Volunteers conducted awareness rallies and door-to-door campaigning in the households present in the vicinity of the college. They interacted with the general public on the importance and ways of maintaining personal and public hygiene. Tree plantation and garbage collection drives were undertaken within the college premises. Volunteers also undertook a cleanliness drive in a school of visually challenged girl students.

In the college computer lab, our volunteers logged-in and attended live telecast of the launch of <u>Fit India Movement</u>, a nation-wide movement to encourage people to remain healthy and fit . The event was held on 29th August 2019 on National Sports Day, thus generating due awareness towards health and fitness.

<u>i-Safe Launch Event</u> was a one-day training programme held at IIT-Delhi on 07th September,2019 where our volunteers got trained on various aspects of Road Safety . The volunteers who got trained, further shared their learning experience with other students in the college.

NSS volunteers visited 'Gandhi Smriti' at Rajgath, New Delhi on 14th September 2019. A documentary film on the life of Gandhiji was shown to them at the venue. '<u>Nukkad Natak'</u> based on Gandhian ideology was performed by 14 NSS volunteers and their performance was applauded by the general public present at the venue.

<u>Electoral Verification Camp</u> held in the college from 19th September 2019 till 24thSeptember 2019 provided an opportunity for electoral verification and correction in data for many students of the college and for their family members too in a few cases.

On the occasion of <u>NSS Day</u> on 24/09/2019, a workshop on First - Aid training was organised in the college. The training was conducted by Dr Trivendra Chumbak, CMO of



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West-Zone, University of Delhi. It was followed by an interactive talk session on Health and Nutrition.

<u>Public Lecture</u> on the topic 'Public Diplomacy leaving the cage' by Honourable German Ambassador, Walter J.Lindner, held at the Convention Hall, University of Delhi on 25th September, 2019 was attended by 15 volunteers.

Poster Making event on '<u>Plastic Waste Management'</u> was held on 3rd October 2019 to strengthen awareness towards adopting correct measures for disposing plastic waste. Along with this, students were also encouraged to minimize their use of plastic and shift to the use of alternatives like cloth bags etc.

The First 'Shri <u>Arun Jately Memorial Lecture'</u> delivered by Shri M.Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'able Vice President of India held at University of Delhi was attended by 20 students on 29th October 2019.

Essay-Writing and Slogan –Writing Competitions on the theme of <u>Anti-Corruption</u> were held on 30th October 2019. Later, selected Slogans were displayed in the NSS Room and shortlisted essays were read out during our meeting with the volunteers with the aim of spreading awareness towards complete integrity and honesty in public life.

<u>Unity Run</u> followed by <u>Pledge-taking</u> on Anti-Corruption was held on 31st October 2019. Pledge was administered in the presence of our respected Principal Mam, Dr Harpreet Kaur. Mam encouraged our volunteers with her motivational talk.

On 1st November 2019, an Interactive talk session on the life and ideology of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel was conducted and moderated by Dr. Meenakshi Sinha Swami, a faculty member of the college.

Online Quiz on Gandhian Ideology was held in the college Computer lab on 4th January 2020. This was a follow-up to our visit to Gandhi Smriti in September, 2019.

Walkathon on <u>'Fit India'</u> was held on 18th January 2020. This was a follow – up by NSS volunteers to Fit India campaign in the country. Volunteers participated with great enthusiasm in this event with placards in their hands motivating others to adopt a healthy lifestyle.

<u>National Voters Day</u> was observed with a pledge taken by NSS Volunteers on 24th January 2020. The oath was administered in the august presence of our Principal Mam.



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Walkathon on the theme of saving and caring for Girl Child was organised 24th January 2020. <u>Poetry Recitation</u> was also conducted in the college on the theme ' Beti bachao ,Beti padao' on the occasion.

Second Swachhta Pakhwada was organized from 16th January 2020 till 31st January 2020. Activities conducted were a) Poster Making Competition with 'Clean India' and 'Forest Conservation' as themes, b) Best Out of Waste Competition c) Awareness Rally on Cleanliness d) Cleanliness Drive and e) Oath taking for maintaining cleanliness in the surroundings.

Workshop on training our volunteers for Self Defence was conducted in the college campus on 05^{th} February 2020 by Mr. Devansh Sekri , a 3^{rd} Dan Black Belt and National and International Medal winner in Karate.

During the lockdown period (25th March 2020 till date), our volunteers have remained active in spreading awareness about importance of social distancing, urging students to take preventive measures like keeping hands clean and not touching mouth and eye region with unclean hands, demonstrating ways of making masks at home and urging people to stay at home during the lockdown via use of e-posters. Volunteers also urged people to observe Janta Curfew and light diyas/flashlights at night as per guidelines from our Honourable Prime Minister.

All NSS volunteers have downloaded Aarogya Setu App and are making use of it. We are also encouraging others to use the app recommended by the Government of India.

Report
The Department of Philosophy and IQAC of Mata Sundri College for Women organised a webinar on 9 th May 2020 entitled "Intellectual Property Rights in Traditional Knowledge and Biodiversity". The webinar commenced at 12.30 p.m. with introductory remark made by Dr Manisha Mathur, member of IQAC, which was followed by the welcome address presented by the honourable principal Dr Harpreet Kaur who introduced the esteemed speaker Professor (Dr) Amar Singh, highlighting his eventful career in the field of education and the topic of discussion for the day.
The session was then handed over to the eminent speaker. He began by calling traditional knowledge and biodiversity rich economic resources and delineated on the meaning of traditional knowledge. The speaker then elucidated the denotation of Intellectual Property Rights and its importance in the field of biodiversity, the main tools of IPR being patents, copy rights, trademarks and geographical indications. The tools of IPR are designed to safeguard the interests of the preserving indigenous community.
The discussion then directed towards the regime of IPR that is contingent upon the nature of the economy and varies from one to another namely the capitalist system, the socialist system and the mixed economic system. In the regime, the final aim of the capitalist system is the marketing of IPR for profit making, while in a socialist system, the aim concerns the use of IPR for the benefit of the citizens and safeguard the interest of the primary stakeholders concerned.
The speaker then discussed the immanent politics of conflict of interest between the holders of traditional knowledge and the prospectants who are involved in commodifying traditional knowledge for the use of global market. He also outlined the objectives and purposes of global agreements on IPR such as Convention of Biodiversity (CBD) and Trade related aspects of IPR (TRIPS). He provided the audience with an assessment of protection guaranteed under these two initiatives. He also highlighted the practice of countries of global worth who are holding back several pirated patents of Indian traditional knowledge and enumerated some examples like neem oil patent held back by the European patent, turmeric patent held back by the USA patent. The speaker elucidated efforts undertaken by the government of India to document traditional knowledge by creating a Traditional Knowledge Digital Library (TKDL), however,
he also highlighted the loopholes of the Indian IPR regime as found in the biodiversity act of 2002 which does not fully safeguard the interests of the indigenous knowledge bearers.
Having emphasised the loopholes, the speaker suggested legal improvements and required administrative action that would ensure the benefit sharing to the indigenous communities. As a conclusion, the speaker aptly noted the moral issues involved in strengthening the IPR regime of India and further the economic benefits that would accrue to the communities as a result of the strengthening of the former.
The session was then followed by the question and answer round moderated by Dr Hemlata Krishnani who prominently took questions of the audience regarding safeguarding the traditional knowledge. The speaker answered the questions while emphasising the idea of kitchen of the houses being a storehouse of tradition knowledge where one can find number of ingredients with medicinal benefits.
The question answer round was followed by the vote of thanks delivered by Dr Lakshmi Vatsa, teacher-in-charge, Department of Philosophy, who wholeheartedly thanked the eminent




Figure 35: Image of the poster of Fit India Movement organized by our NCC Unit.




Figure 38: An Image of the Poster of Handwash Day.
