

The final round featured two debate sessions with four participants in each group. The judges—Jamia Millia Islamia professor journalist Danish Iqbal, Vivek Shukla and professor Suprita Jha of Mata Sundri College-chose the top speaker from each group. Trivedi and Jasmehar Kaur from DU's Sri Guru Gobind Singh College of Commerce advanced to the final round, where they debated the pros and cons of the gig economy.

Runner-up Jasmehar Kaur, awarded Rs 1.5 lakh, reflected on the experience, "This has been a journey of learning. It showed me how much more there is to grow." Kaur has taken the stage nearly 100 times before in various capacities. Each of the other six finalists received 50,000.
